The project (in a nutshell):

Phase 1: Workshops

a series of interactive music workshops devised for dementia patients that will uncover the songs and melodies that are important to them and their lives.

Phase 2: Creative Exploration inform the creation of a live, immersive performance piece rooted in music, song, spoken word and video design

Phase 3: Performance

a fascinating insight for audiences of the relationship between memory and music, the realities of living with dementia and the role that music plays in our lives



Workshops

- We were welcomed to the Alzheimer's Society's 'Singing for the Brain' workshops experiences where we met the incredibly inspiring dementia community of Wakefield
- Working in collaboration with Jo Currie from the Alzheimer's Society we designed three Sing and Share workshops.

- Story hunting, prompting discussion through song




The piece follows the story of a musical family, a father, Mother and daughter and the early part of their dementia journey, from diagnosis, to their efforts to come to terms with what this means for them, the challenges of being a carer and to a reconciliation to what this means for them and how they can find their best way forward. It is a celebration of and

synthesis of our personal experiences, the experiences of carers, the memories of participants and of the music that has played a part in their lives.
